SCHOLARSHIP STUDENT HIGHLIGHT: DANIEL GONZALES, PhD

Central High School graduate and first-generation college student Daniel Gonzales is an excellent example of how scholarship funds at the San Angelo Area Foundation create brighter futures. A recipient of the Art and Eva Tucker Scholarship, Gonzales earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Physics from Angelo State University in 2013. While at ASU, Daniel interned at NASA Glen Research Center, exposing him to the dynamic world of scientific research.

Gonzales then began graduate work in the Applied Physics Program at Rice University. This provided a core foundation in fundamental physics, but also gave him the freedom

to choose a research advisor from nearly any academic department. Neuroengineering, where engineers and scientists of all backgrounds develop new technologies to study the brain, enthralled Gonzales. He received his PhD in Applied Physics in May 2019 and was recognized for his work by prestigious graduate fellowships from the National Science Foundation and peerreviewed publications in scientific journals.

Being at the forefront of science and engineering gave Dr. Gonzales the goal of one day running his own university neuroscience laboratory. Dr. Gonzales is now a Lillian Gilbreth postdoctoral

researcher at Purdue University, performing full-time research in the Weldon School of Biomedical Engineering. He is developing a technology called the Nano-Needle Net, an array of nano-sized sensors that sit on the surface of the brain and gently penetrate into the outermost layers to record neural activity at the nanoscale. In September 2019, the Howard Hughes Medical Institute recognized Dr. Gonzales as an outstanding early-career researcher and named him a Hanna Gray Fellow. This prestigious award provides Dr. Gonzales with nearly \$1.4 million in funding over the next eight years to develop the Nano-Needle Net and to establish his own research program as a university faculty.

DISASTER PHILANTHROPY UPDATE

Responding to our neighbors in need

West Texas has seen its share of disasters this past year, from the devastating flood in Sonora in September 2018 to a tornado that hit San Angelo and the surrounding area in May. Combined, these two events impacted more than 300 homes in the Concho Valley, leaving our neighbors in desperate need. As one of the many critical philanthropic efforts needed to support those effected, these communities collaborated with the San Angelo Area Foundation and utilized our ability to quickly manage and award emergency grants by creating the Sonora Flood Relief Fund and the San Angelo Disaster Relief Fund.

The overwhelming response of support and encouragement from friends and neighbors across the nation lifted those impacted during their most vulnerable times.

Contributions to the disaster response effort of these events, in collaboration with the inspiring efforts of community volunteers, churches, local government and nonprofit organizations created meaningful impact for those individuals and families whose lives were uprooted. Heartfelt giving combined with the generosity of other foundations, corporations, individuals and numerous volunteers helped raise more than \$966,000 collectively. Over the course of 14 months, the Sonora Flood Relief Fund and San Angelo Disaster Fund combined distributed more than \$787,000 directly to impacted individuals and families for immediate relief, long-term recovery, and rebuilding.

The San Angelo Area Foundation continues to work with community leadership, local government, and response organizations. Remaining funds will be distributed for continued repairs and rebuilding for the many still picking up the pieces.

Through tragedy, we witnessed the outpouring of generosity. The compassion shown provided hope and healing for our neighbors in need.
